

Consent and Release Agreement for Permanent Cosmetics

If client cancels appointment or reschedules less than 48 hours before appointment time there will be a cancellation fee of \$25

It is the client's responsibility to read the Policies on appointments, cancellation fees, payments, Before and Care, Restrictions, Contraindications, and Disclaimers in its entirety. Once an appointment has been made, it will be an automatic agreement to accept & comply. Cancellation fees or deposits will not be refundable under any circumstances.

This form is designed to give information needed to make an informed choice of whether or not to undergo a permanent cosmetics application. If you have questions, please don't hesitate to ask.

Although permanent cosmetic tattooing is affective in most cases, no guarantee can be made that a specific client will benefit from the procedure.

This is the process of inserting pigment into the dermal layer of the skin and is a form of tattooing. All instruments that enter the skin or come in contact with body fluids are sealed and sterilized before use and disposed of after use. Cross contamination guidelines are stickily adhered to.

Generally, the results are excellent. However, a perfect result is not a realistic expectation. It is usual to expect a touch-up after the healing is completed.

Initially the color will appear much more vibrant or darker compared to the end result. Usually within 57 days the color will fade 10-50%, soften and look more natural. The pigment is permanent but will fade somewhat over time and will likely need to be touched-up through the years.

Photography and Videography Release Consent

2nd City Ink requires "Before" and "After" photos/videos be taken and kept on file. We would like your permission to use these photos/videos for advertising. For example, in portfolios, online and in print adds, ect. Your consent is necessary regarding this. Checking this box gives 2nd City Ink the consent to use your photo across any of our online platforms and social media, and for print.

Possible risks, hazards or complications

- Pain: There can be pain even after the topical anesthetic has been used. Anesthetics work better on some people than others. Lip procedures are more likely to involve some pain.
- Infection: Infection is very unusual. The areas treated must be kept clean and only freshly cleaned hands should touch the areas. See "After Care" sheet for instructions on care.
- Uneven Pigmentation: This can result from poor healing, infection, bleeding or many other causes. Your follow up appointment will likely correct any uneven appearance.
- Asymmetry: Every effort will be made to avoid asymmetry but our faces are not symmetrical so adjustments may be needed during the follow up session to correct any unevenness.
- Excessive Swelling or Bruising: Some people bruise and swell more than others. Ice packs may help and the bruising and swelling typically disappears with 1-5 days. Some people don't bruise or swell at all.
- Eye Exposure: There is a small risk of eye injury when an eyeliner procedure is performed. To avoid corneal abrasion, Celluvisc, a thick eye drop is used to protect the eye prior to the procedure. Eye drops are used to cleanse and flush the eye after the procedure is complete.
- Anesthesia: Topical anesthetics are used to numb the area to be tattooed. Lidocaine, Prilocaine, Benzocaine, Tetracaine and Epinephrine in a cream or gel form are typically used. If you are allergic to any of these please inform me now.
- MRI: Because pigments used in permanent cosmetic procedures contain inert oxides, a low level magnet may be required if you need to be scanned by an MRI machine. You must inform your technician of any tattoos or permanent cosmetics.
- Fever Blisters: If you are prone to cold sores or fever blisters, (herpes simplex), there is a high probability that you will get them. It is advised that you call your doctor for a prescription antiviral to help prevent this from occurring.
- Allergic Reaction: There is a small possibility of an allergic reaction. You may take a 5-7 day patch test to determine this.

The alternative to these possibilities is to use cosmetics and not undergo the Permanent Cosmetics procedure.

STATEMENT OF CONSENT AND RECITALS:

Please read and initial all lines

___Aftercare instructions have been explained to me and a written copy will be given to me to retain in my possession, which I will follow to the best of my ability. If I have questions I will call or email you.

___I understand that a certain amount of discomfort is associated with this procedure and that swelling, redness and bruising may occur.

___Fever blisters may occur in lip procedures in individuals who have the herpes simplex virus and it is my responsibility to obtain a prescription from my doctor for an anti-viral medication to help avoid a breakout.

___I understand that Retin A, Renova, Alpha Hydroxy and Glycolic Acids must not be used on the treated areas. They will alter the color.

___I understand that sun, tanning beds, pools, some skin care products and medications can affect my permanent makeup.

___I understand that successful lip color saturation can NOT be guaranteed due to hidden scar tissue.

___I will tell all skin care professionals or medical personnel about my permanent makeup procedures, especially if I'm scheduled for an MRI.

___I accept the responsibility for explain to you my desire for specific colors, shape, and position for any procedure done today.

___I understand that implanted pigment color can slightly change or fade over time due to circumstances beyond your control and I will need to maintain the color with future applications and a touch up session within 60 days.

___I acknowledge that the proposed procedure(s) involve risks inherent in the procedure and have possibilities of complications during and/or following the procedures such as: infection, misplaced pigment, poor color retention and hyper-pigmentation.

___I have been quoted the cost of today's appointment which does not include touch up.

___ I understand this is a two-step process. I will not be eligible for a refund once first session is completed.

___I accept full responsibility for the decision to have this cosmetic tattoo work done.

I certify that I have read or have had read to me the contents of this form. I understand the risks and alternatives involved in this procedure(s) and I have had the opportunity to ask questions and all of my questions have been answered. I acknowledge that I have reviewed and approved the material given to me and I authorize YOUR NAME, as my permanent cosmetics technician to perform on my body the following procedures.

Aftercare

Follow the instruction below for the next 7 days or until scabs are completely gone.

- For Microblading, wipe off Magic Sealer after 4-5 hours with a damp cotton pad.
- Clean eyebrows at the end of the day with a damp cotton pad.
- For oily skin, dry heal (NO ointment or anything applied to the eyebrows).
- For non-oily skin, after 48 hours, apply After Care Gel or A&D ointment 1-2 times daily.
- Keep eyebrows dry (avoid them being submerged in water for too long; ex. Swimming or sauna. A quick shower or washing face is fine, just avoid the eyebrow area)
- No exercising, tanning, waxing or threading.
- No makeup, eyebrow pencil, lotion or other facial products on the eyebrows.
- If necessary, use an eyebrow pencil to touch up after eyebrows heal completely.

What to expect (days may vary for everyone):

- Immediately after: shape may appear uneven due to swelling
- Day 1 – 3: eyebrows will appear darker and thick.
- Day 4 – 7: eyebrows will be dry and itchy. Do not scratch, rub or pick at them. They may start to scab, crack or flake off. Eyebrows will look patchy and uneven during healing process. It is absolutely normal and crucial to leave them alone. Please DON'T PANIC.
- Day 7 – 10: scabs should be all gone (some can take up to 3 weeks) Sometimes eyebrows will appear as if there is no color. The remaining color has absorbed under the layer of skin and in the following week it will resurface as skin cells repair.
- Week 3 – 4: eyebrows will appear their true color. Eyebrow might still look patchy or have an uneven shape. Some rare cases the pigment does not retain well. (in this case please visit www.AdvanceMicroblading.com and look for question #18 in FAQ)
- Week 4 – 6: come back for a touch up. Any small corrections can be made at this visit.

Please Note:

Subjective effect on different individuals, e.g. skin types that affect the attachment of color. Most clients will need two sessions; some will only need one and some will need a third touch-up to complete the look at an additional charge.

Failure to follow after care instructions may result in infections, pigment loss or discoloration.
